

THE ROCHESTER CORNERSTONE IS FOUND!

We are glad that Rev. Wilmer Quiring came to ask about the Cornerstone that was in the Seminary Building in Rochester, NY. When he realized that the old building was being torn down he requested the Cornerstone with the date 1890 engraved in Then his wife Eleanor saw that the it. demolition crew was almost ready to tear that part down she rushed home to tell Wilmer to go and get it. He did and when they loaded it into his trunk with a forklift it was so heavy that he had to drive home with extreme care. A friend of his was able to cut it down to a manageable size so he could bring it to Sioux Falls. That was in the 70's and it was tucked away in a safe corner in the furnace room to be undisturbed until Nov. 1994. When Rev. Quiring came in to ask about it we could not find it, however George Lang recalled that a large cornerstone had been stored in the furnace room. We went to look. It is still so heavy that it takes two men to carry it. It is being prepared for display along with a picture of the building showing clearly where the stone had originally been placed.
