

HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE REFLECTIONS

Rev. Wilmer Quiring's Story of rescuing the 1890 Cornerstone.

Imagine seeing your old school building being torn down and you ask for the cornerstone as a keepsake. Wilmer was promised the stone. So when they began demolishing that corner his wife, Eleanor, saw it in time for her to rush home to tell her husband to go and get that stone.

He took his car and asked the demolition crew if he could take it. The workers said he could have it but where was his truck. He only had his car and so asked them to put it into the trunk.

They lowered the 600 pound stone carefully by crane into the car trunk and watched the springs go down, down, down. It stopped just before the breaking point. Then Wilmer drove 10 miles home very slowly and very carefully. In fact he says, "I had to almost stand up to drive so I could see the road."

Friends and family helped to take it out of the trunk of his car.

A member of his church came to cut the stone down to approximately 150 pounds. Then it was crated and brought to the Seminary in Sioux Falls, SD. At that time the plan was to be put it into the new addition of the Seminary. That was Wilmer's reason to come to look for the stone. It was still in hiding.

For a number of years it was waiting for its new place but with new personnel and staff it was in hiding until George W. Lang remembered seeing it.

It was taken out of hiding and given a face lift and a lovely pedestal. If you remember where Dr. George A. Lang's Presidential office was in the first years and later where Isabelle Long had her office. That is the spot that you can now see THE STONE as you leave the Education\Library building and go to the new Worship and Leadership Centre.

Above it as large picture of the building where it served as the Cornerstone. There are two smaller pictures of the other buildings which served as the homes for Our NAB Seminary.
