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Viewing the Horizons:

We are told that nostalgia is a bittersweet longing for persons, things, or situations of the past or homesickness.

Heritage does not really fit that definition for me. There are some bitter things and some sweet things in my past but homesickness is not one of those. The past is much more than memories put into those categories. It is a foundation upon which my life and all the decisions I made and will make are based.

There are a number of "what ifs" to be considered in regard to people and events.

What if my Sunday School teacher, Mrs. Hoekman (the mother-in-law of Dr. Richard Schilke) had not prepared the soil of my heart to accept Christ later?

What if that young man had not given Konrad Flieschman a tract during his travels in Europe? Who would God have used to begin the work among the German Immigrants in the USA?

What if that person who spoke to you about Christ giving His life for you had not done it? Where and what would you be doing today?

Such ideas cause me to think of God's way of working in our lives. It was a Christian doctor who refused to give up his principles of witnessing and was used by God to lead Aleksandr Solzhenitsyn to Christ. We do not hear about that doctor, except that he died for sharing Christ; but we can read much that was written by Solzhenitsyn.

God used an open-air baptismal service being conducted by a Negro Baptist congregation to convince our pioneer leader, Christopher Schoemaker, that baptism by immersion was the scriptural way to obey.

Discipling and discipleship is a continuing event of life. Who knows when a piece of paper, a Sunday School Teacher, a baptismal scene, being a medical doctor willing to live and witness for Christ even though it means death or a comment you make can point someone to Christ. That person in turn could be the one who will help another find a worthwhile life in Christ Jesus.

Perhaps it is the person who is seeking an office in your city's council or state government.


Research Requests:

PROFILE: Christopher Schoemaker



"Our dear old Brother Schoemaker" was a disciple who did not compromise in the convictions he had in living the Christian life. For him Salvation had its joys and responsibilities. He was a Separatist Christian at the age of 25. To join that group there had to be evidence of having experienced a change of heart.

After seeing a Negro congregation baptizing new members, C. Schoemaker and his group went home to search the Scriptures and became convinced that they had seen the Biblical way of baptizing by immersion.

He was of Dutch descent but learned the German Language and became so fluent in it that he was able to preach to the German members of his congregation and continued with them after the Dutch members gradually moved away from the city of St. Louis, MO.

Pastor Schoemaker served as a pastor for 51 years, from 1850 to 1901 and retired at the age of 83. He served the following churches: First Church of Buffalo, NY; Concordia, MO; and Muscatine, IA.
