A mustard-seed miracle? Read about it on page 3.



## A MODERN DAY MUSTARD-SEED MIRACLE

### The Story of The Village Creek Bible Camp, Lansing IA, by Myron H. Dudek

In the summer of 1960 during the annual sessions of the Northwestern Conference of the North American Baptist General Conference, the youth camp volunteer leaders of three states (IA, MN and WI) were discussing their individual youth camp programs. Each state rented a campground facility for one or two weeks each year and usually were limited to the early or late weeks of the summer, because the owners rightfully preferred the prime weeks of each summer for their own camp program. As their conversation proceeded, the comment was made, **"IT SURE WOULD BE NICE IF WE COULD FIND A CAMPGROUND NEAR LACROSSE, WISCONSIN WHERE THE THREE STATES COULD HAVE CAMP TOGETHER."** 

<u>Ten years later</u>, a layman from Steamboat Rock, IA found a farm for sale with good potential for a campground in Lansing, IA, about thirty miles from La Crosse, WI. During that ten-year span of time, the states of WI, MN and IL had gradually combined their camp programs to a campground in northern Wisconsin. Knowing this, the Steamboat Rock, IA layman asked the Iowa Christian Education Committee to invite the three states to a viewing of this farm with a prayerful desire to develop a four-state camp. Pastors and laymen from Illinois and Iowa visited the site on December 21, 1970 and the "mustard seed" blossomed into the early days of development of what is now <u>Village Creek Bible Camp</u>.

The more we ponder the early beginning of this Camp, the more we realize that God motivated the right people at the right time to do HIS will in the development and encouragement of this ministry. With a thousand campers each summer and many Fall, Winter and Spring retreats for all ages, we can only praise God for each "partner" in this ministry, each one who over the past thirty years has had a part in what we are able to enjoy today. **PRAISE GOD!!** 

Footnote: Among the camp leaders in discussion at the Northwestern Conference in 1960, were Marilyn Schaer, her cousin Mary Ann Schaer (now deceased) and Myron Dudek. The layman from Steamboat Rock, IA was Harry Luiken (deceased October 2005). Rev. Eldon Schroeder provided information about the year of the Northwestern Conference, when this **mustard seed** was planted in Racine, Wisconsin.

Editor's Note: Telephone conversations with Mr. Myron Dudek and Rev. Orville Meth have brought the additional information that currently Mr. Thomas Treptau is serving as Director of the Village Creek Camp, together with his wife, Camie (Bohlen) Treptau, a position they have held for nine years, and also that Rev. Orville Meth was Chairman of the Board at the time this original momentous decision was made. Rev. Orville Meth has been an influential blessing for many years in his service as Chairman of the Board of the NAB Heritage Commission.

#### A Personal Perspective of Early NAB History To Be Available in an English Translation: — George W. Lang, Archives Director

A unique and valuable piece of history of the early years of the German Baptist Conference in the United States and Canada has been recently translated from German into English by Dr. Donald Madvig, formerly a professor at the North American Baptist Seminary.

This very descriptive book called <u>Memories</u> (*Erinnerungen* in German) was written by Reverend G.A. Schulte. Reverend Schulte served as the General Mission Secretary of the German Baptist Conference from 1892-1916. He visited many churches in the United States and Canada during the time of their early years and their years of significant growth — because in those years Home Missions and Overseas Missions were included in the same arena of oversight and responsibility.

Before serving as General Missionary Secretary, Reverend Schulte served as pastor of the German Baptist Church in Buffalo, NY for seven years beginning in 1863, and then as pastor of the First (German Baptist) Church in New York City for twenty-two years.

Lois Glewwe, member of the Riverview Baptist Church of West St. Paul, MN, has agreed to be the Editor. Her plan is to enhance this translation by using sidebars that provide related pictures, together with background information and helpful explanations, providing these throughout the book. This translation shall also contain a detailed index. Lois Glewwe shall be working with Berneice Westerman, the NAB Heritage Commission's Archivist, and Dr. Jackie Howell, Associate Archivist.

The goal is to make this publication available at the coming Triennial Sessions to take place July 5-9 at Estes Park, CO. As time progresses, we shall give you more details. Keep in touch.
