

# Because of His Unfailing Kindness, We Give

"How I cried out to you, my God, when I read the Psalms of David, those hymns of faith, those songs of a pious heart in which the spirit of pride can find no place! . . . How they set me on fire with love for you! I was burning to echo them to all the world, if only I could . . . ," wrote St. Augustine. The theme of this year's Celebration of Gratitude offering is "Because of His Unfailing Kindness, We Give" (Psalm 18:50 NIV).

In Psalm 18, David bursts into extemporaneous praise to God for his power and mercy. The occasion for this praise, according to 2 Samuel 22, is the death of Saul and the end of David's long flight from Saul's vengeance. David probably looked back over all the events of his life and saw clearly the working of God in so many of them.

In Psalm 18:1-3, David notes the all-sufficiency of God's salvation; in verses 25-29, the mercy and kindness of God, and in verses 30-36 that the way of the Lord is perfect. David concludes Psalm 18 by giving thanks to God and praising God for his unfailing kindness.

"Therefore, I will praise you among the nations, O Lord,

I will sing praises to your name. . .

He shows unfailing kindness to his anointed,

To David and his descendants" (Ps. 18:49-50 NIV).

Thanksgiving is a time for us to reflect on the past year. We reflect on the struggles and the blessings, and we see woven through all of the events the Lord's handiwork.

Let us affirm with David that because of God's kindnesses towards us that his name is worthy to be praised among all nations. As you reflect on the unfailing kindness of God in your life, consider making a gift to the Celebration of Gratitude Offering.



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
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### Wrong Reasons

Examine your own, motivation, why do you give?

"Mom, would you make me a lunch, please?'

"Where are you going?" was Mother's curious response.

"I want to go and listen to Jesus," her son replied.

The conversation continued; a time was set for him to be home. and the contents of the lunch were discussed. In this home, there were not many options, as the family was poor. It was not a choice between peanut butter and jam, cooked ham or summer sausage.

"I'll put five barley loaves and a couple of fish in a bag for you," Mom said, and off went the lad.

If you have an 11 or 12-year-old son, you are quite aware of how important lunch is to a boy that age. Eagerly, he caught up to the crowd following the Savior, listened and played throughout the morning. Toward noon his biological clock reminded him that he was hungry and out came the lunch. Just then, one of Jesus' disciples, Andrew, walked by and noticed him.

"Would you like to meet Jesus?" he asked. (Notice in Scripture whenever Andrew is mentioned, he is always bringing someone to the Savior.)

"Would you give Jesus your lunch?" came the second question.


In that adolescent, as with most young people that age, we find a simple faith and generosity.

#### Giving for Self


Examine the lad's motivation for giving. He did not give for self. For all he knew, Jesus was going to eat the lunch himself, and he would have none. He did not give to get something back.

Quickly the cliches are marshalled in defense. "Charity begins at home."

"The Lord's instructions were Jerusalem first then Judea, Samaria and, (if there is any left over.) the uttermost part of the earth."

"There are real needs in our own neighborhood and the local church." I realize that, and don't

misunderstand me, but do we only

give if we get the benefit? What are your true reasons for giving?

Simon offered to give to Peter and John, but he wanted the same power the apostles demonstrated. Simon was ready to give if he could get something in return.

Peter said to him, "May your money perish with you, because you thought you could buy the gift of God with money! You have no part or share in this ministry, because your heart is not right with God." (Acts 8:20, 21 NIV). Selfish giving betrays the condition of the heart.

Teaching in the Pharisee's house over lunch Jesus said, "When you give a luncheon or dinner, do not invite your friends, your brothers or relatives, or your rich neighbors; if you do, they may invite you back and so you will be repaid. But when you give a banquet, invite the poor, the crippled, the lame, and you will be blessed. Although they cannot repay you, you will be repaid at the resurrection of the righteous" (Luke 14:12-14 NIV).

Examine your own motivation, why do you give? Giving for self is not giving at all! Give with no intention of receiving benefit from your gift.

#### Giving to Be Seen

Some of us give to be seen. Nobody noticed the young lad in the crowd, apart from Andrew. Nobody heard the conversation; nobody saw the lunch change hands. It was not announced that lunch was courtesy of one young boy. The master of ceremonies for the day did not call the lad to the center of the crowd and give an eloquent dissertation on the boy's philanthropic nature. Nobody knew. What happened was the young lad gave away his lunch. He did not give it to be seen.

How do we give? The little result (Acts 5:1-5).

"When you give to the needy, do not let your left hand know what your right hand is doing, so that your giving may be in secret. Then your Father, who sees what is done in secret will reward you."

"So when you give to the needy, do not announce it with trumpets. as the hyprocrites do in the synagogues and on the streets, to be honoured by men. I tell you the truth, they have received their reward in full. But when you give to the needy, do not let your left hand know what your right hand is doing, so that your giving may be in secret. what is done in secret will reward you" (Matt. 6:1-4 NIV).

Giving with Strings and Stipulations Others give with strings and stipulations. I am willing to give, but it must be used the way I direct. Suppose the young lad that day knew the Lord would work a miracle.

He might have said, "All right, I'll give my lunch, but 20 percent of the increase must go to my community. There are real needs there."

He did not do that. He gave unreservedly with no strings attached and no stipulations pending. He gave with simple transparency of motive, because he wanted the Savior to have his lunch.

Scripture is full of examples of what happens when we give to the Lord without stipulations and strings. It is this unreserved, unconditional giving that the Lord honors; vet how often we give only if the gift will be used the way we stipulate.

Oh, it may not be for our own benefit, but by placing stipulations upon our giving, we are in effect saying to the Lord, "We know better how this should be used than do you."

How often is your gift given with stipulations and strings attached? Conditional giving is not real giving at all.

#### Giving the Soiled and Superfluous

Finally, we give the soiled and superfluous. There was nothing soiled or superfluous about the young lad's lunch. The bread was not moldy, or the fish spoiled; that lunch was as appetizing and appealing as an adoring mother could make it, and it certainly was not superfluous. It was the only lunch

he had; it represented a significant portion of his family's provisions.

Does your giving consist of the worn-out rumpus room furniture. the out-of-date styles in your clothes closet, the garden equipment that you have replaced with the latest model? So often we give that for which we have no further use-that which costs us nothing.

King David had sinned. The Lord convicted him and gave specific directions as to David's sacrifice:

"Go up and build an altar to the Lord on the threshing floor of Araunah the Jebusite."

David followed the Lord's direction, and when Araunah saw the king approaching, he asked, "Why has my Lord the King come to his servant?"

"To buy your threshing floor," David replied.

Araunah offered to give King David not only the threshing floor but the oxen and the wood for the offering, but David's response showed his insight and spiritual maturity.

"No, I insist on paying you for it," David said.

"I will not sacrifice to the Lord my God burnt offerings that cost me nothing" (2 Samuel 24:24).

Do we give that which costs us nothing?

The Lord watched as the poor widow approached the place where offerings were given at the temple. She put in two very small copper coins worth only a fraction of a penny. What was his response?

He called his disciples and said to them, "I tell you the truth, this poor widow has put more into the treasury than all the others. They all gave out of their wealth; but she.

out of her poverty, put in everything-all she had to live on" (Mark 12:42 NIV).

She put in everything-all she had to live on. Is our giving motivated by our affluence? Do we give the superfluous? The Lord does not want that which costs us nothing.


The spiritual state of the children of Israel had sunk to the despicable place where they brought as offerings to the Lord the blind, the lame, the sick, the damaged. They gave that which they would not use themselves. God was displeased and refused to accept such offerings.

"Let us give motivated by the love for the Savior who gave himself for us and by the concern he has placed in our hearts for the teeming millions who do not know him whom to know is life eternal."

Not unlike them, we bring to the Lord the leftovers of our time, talent, and treasure. After we have creamed off the top of our lives, the thick rich portion for ourselves, we give the dregs, the leftovers, to the Savior.

Oh, that we would hear the Lord say to us as he did to the children of Israel of old, "I hate that; you are robbing me."

Giving requires sacrifice. To a hungry lad, it meant giving away



his lunch, the only lunch he had. May our reasons for giving be not that we do not need it or that we do not want it, rather may our giving be sacrificial.

Why do you give? Is it to receive something in return, to be seen, to accomplish your own end, to dispose of what you do not need or want? Current giving programs and modern development psychology deal in the most part with manipulation of the individual based on improper giving motives. Such giving does not honor or please God. If you are a potential large donor. there are so-called Christian organizations who will fly you across the continent and pick you up at the airport in a white Cadillac in order to present their ministry and ask for your gift.

Peter, after the Lord asked him the third time, "Simon, son of Jonas, do you love me?", acknowledged that the Lord knew his heart and motives. We deal with a God who does not look on outward appearances but on the heart. "All things are naked and open before the eyes of him with whom we have to do" (Hebrews 4:13).

#### Giving Out of Love

God has made us in such a way that our make-up requires that we give. "It is better to give than to receive." God has given us the ultimate example of giving: "Thanks be to God for his indescribable gift" (2 Cor. 9:15). As the Lord did with the lad's lunch, he will, when we give to him our substance and ourselves wholly, unreservedly, unconditionally, take us, break us, bless us and multiply in his hand and for his purpose our treasure and our talents. Let us give motivated by our love for the Savior who gave himself for us and by the concern he has placed in our hearts for the teeming millions who do not know him whom to know is life eternal.  $\Box$ 

## The Sacrifice of Thanksgiving by Gideon Zimmerman

he real meaning of some passages in the Scripture are interpreted best through the experiences and testimonies of people. This was true for me with respect to Psalm 116:12 and 17: "What shall I render into the Lord for all his benefits toward me? I will offer to thee the sacrifice of thanksgiving, and will call upon the name of the Lord."

Preaching on this psalm at a Thanksgiving service a number of years ago, I felt that my exposition of the psalm was very clear. However, in my recent travels, the message of these two verses was dramatically interpreted.

Recently, a rather generous contribution was sent to our N.A.B. Conference Office by a North American Baptist couple. Since I was visiting in their area, I stopped to visit them. When I arrived at the home. I found the husband lying on a hospital bed, gravely ill.

Almost immediately, I expressed gratitude for the generous gift which they had sent for the Lord's work, only to be given the response. "Please don't thank us, but thank God who has been so good to us and made possible this gift."

They, then, explained the reason for giving such a generous gift. After building a fairly prosperous business over a number of years, the family was forced to leave Hungary shortly after World War II, because of impending danger to their lives. They were permitted to take with them very limited possessions, as they journeyed to Western Germany.

Upon their arrival, someone directed them to a Baptist church where they were given food and clothing packets, which had been sent to Germany from our North American Baptist Conference Office.

Following World War II, North American Baptists were involved in a very extensive program of sending packets of food and clothing with the inscription, "In Jesus' name," to displaced persons. It was these kinds of packets which they received. Again the couple expressed their gratitude to God and to their brothers and sisters in America.

"What shall I render to the Lord For all His benefits toward me? To Thee I shall offer a sacrifice of thanksgiving. And call upon the name of the Lord" (Psalm 116:12, 17).

They related further that they had come into contact with the North American Baptist Immigration Office in Germany, whose program it was to help displaced persons relocate to Canada and the United States following the War. After arrangements were made, this family was soon on its way to America. At this time, they made a covenant with God. Because of his unique leading in their lives, which included protection and the opportunity to go to a free country, they would provide a "sacrifice of thanksgiving" unto the Lord when resources became available. The generous offering which they gave recently was the fulfillment of their covenant. Again, I expressed gratitude for the

They repeated, "Please do not thank us, but thank God, who delivered us from danger and brought us to America and who made this gift

As we stood beside the bed of the father. I took his German Bible and read once again from Psalm 116.

As I read, I began to understand with much greater dimension the meaning of the verse, "I will offer to thee the sacrifice of thanksgiving."

I then suggested that we pray. The wife interrupted asking if her husband could pray first in his language, Hungarian.

Listening to his prayer, I sensed his sincerity; even though I could not understand the words. Later, his wife told me his thoughts are fully clear and coherent; even though at other times coherency is lacking. One could not help but feel the presence of God in this man's life. Communion through prayer remained a continuous contact with God who was his source of refuge, strength, hope, and steadfastness of faith.

"What shall I render unto the Lord for his benefits toward me?" This question struck me anew. My wife and I have given our lives to the Lord as a ministry of sacrifice. We have tried to be generous in support of the Lord's work by giving tithes and offerings, but this experience raised the question, "Have we really offered to God the 'sacrifice of thanksgiving'?"

In relating the impact of this experience, it is impossible to communicate the inner feelings which we experienced as we listened to this couple's testimony. Through them, God communicated that our benefits from the Lord really require a sacrifice of thanksgiving.

Each of us could enumerate a long list of God's unusual benefits. From time to time, we stop and consider these. We are amazed at God's goodness.

As each of us takes such an inventory, let us, in the quietness of our own heart, utter the statement of the Psalmist: "What shall I render unto the Lord for all his benefits to me?"

Do our present plans, as well as our final estate plans, include an offering to God-a "sacrifice of thanksgiving?"

### Because of God's Lovingkindness, We Give by William Nso Tayui

"For God so loved the world that he gave his one and only Son, that whoever believes in him shall not perish but have eternal life," (John 3:16) NIV.

The above verse is a glorious passage of the Christian faith. This verse reveals the mind of God towards a needy world. The world was in need of a Savior. God demonstrated his kindness to man when he gave his only son.

Lovingkindness opens the heart to give, and giving is an opportunity for Christian service. Of course, those of us who are not directly called to the ministry of preaching in the pulpit serve by our giving. This is done in various ways. Because of God's lovingkindness, we not only give during the usual Harvest-Thanksgiving Festival, but also as often as the need arises. Although most of us, as Christians, in the Cameroon cannot squarely give proportionately, a few of us who try to, do it. We do this because we know the kind of blessings God gives in return. Here are five Biblical motives for giving:

#### Command

To be great with God, we must be obedient to his commands. In Malachi 3:10 we read, "Bring ye all

#### Honesty

Malachi 3 speaks of honesty. Here, the principle of honesty should prompt us to give. For if we are honest with God, he will also be honest to give to his servants.

#### Love

Where there is love, there is a desire to demonstate this love to the one you love. We give to God's work to show that we love him. Christians who do not cheerfully give to God show that they do not really love him; even though they profess that they do. We cannot love our children and allow them to wear filthy clothes and starve. We provide for them, because we love them. So it is when we provide for the Lord's work.

#### Gratitude

We ought to give out of gratitude for what God has done for us. What does it mean to you that Christ died for you? It means God gave his only son; he emptied heaven of its greatest treasure for you and me. Therefore, in gratitude, every Christian should give for the propagation of the Gospel of Christ.

#### Faith

Do you believe God? Oh yes, you may say, "I believe every word in the Bible."

God says, "Bring ye all the tithes into the store house." This is a test of faith (Malachi 3:10-11).

While God calls for all our tithes, he ends up with a promise. We get this feeling from Proverbs 3:9-10, and this, of course, is the proof of his lovingkindness.

The primary motive for our giving is the fact that God has a reward for every faithful gift and giver.

Above all, our faith should prompt us to give cheerfully. God has been faithful to us. We ought to be faithful to him through the ministry of our giving.

It is with these Biblical motives that I have sought to meet God's commands in providing for his service. I have experienced great blessings from him in all my life as a servant of the Lord.

Traveling six miles to church by bicycle over rutty, muddy roads, Tiburcio Garcia at 73 is not hindered in his desire to learn more of the Word of God. 

Pray that permanent visas will again be granted to new missionaries. Presently the government is granting only two-year visas to new missionaries.


*Pray* that in the near future more missionaries will be sent as our last new couple was appointed almost four years ago.

#### Ministry of Banso Hospital Extends into Many Areas

The ministry of a hospital extends into many areas. The healing ministry is our most obvious function. Figures, however, are not able to share the human side of the hospital-the joy of recovery from a

major illness, or the sorrow that comes-all too often-from the death of a patient.

Teaching is also an integral part of this ministry. The impact from this area is more difficult to evaluate: the impact on future doctors, nurses, and midwives. Perhaps, in the long run, this is



more important than the actual health care delivered at the hospital.

Providing an evangelical Christian witness in this community through the activities of the chaplain, staff. and missionaries rounds out the mission of the hospital.

Changes have come to Banso Baptist Hospital to improve our ministry. After beginning the year with a single doctor, staffing was increased to three full-time doctors during the last six months of the year. The addition of a hospital administrator has greatly improved the management of the hospital. A Cameroonian Assistant Director of Nursing Services was trained and has been very helpful in the nursing administration office. The eye work continues to progress with the training of an eve screener, and the establishment of an eve room in the Out Patient Department. A blood bank has been functioning for several months, easing the problem of lack of blood for transfusions. The private ward area was remodeled to allow space for an administrative area. Work on the longawaited airstrip was completed in the spring of 1981 which allows use of the Mission Aviation Fellowship plane.

Many problems are still faced by the hospital. One of the most pressing is in the area of finance. Increasing costs from rising drug, supply, and personnel costs necessitated a 25 percent increase in hospital fees during the latter part of the year. Unfortunately the incomes of our patients do not keep pace with world inflation. One wonders how many people will not come for treatment because of the increased cost. One of our priorities must be to find ways to provide quality medical care at low cost.





No lack of patients and work, shortage of staff, continuing inflation, deficits, and a few labor palavers all seem to lend credence to Solomon's lament—which Satan is pleased to have us accept.

Dr. Jerome C. Fluth, Mbingo Baptist Hospital But, reflecting on the past year in a more Spirit-prompted optimistic mood would reveal that there is change, and *new* things do happen:

Like a totally *new* counselling internship program in cooperation with the Cameroon Baptist Theological College. The intern, the chaplain, and I learned so much. Several patients were healed more fully than they could have been before.

Like the *new* birth in dozens of patients.

Like Spiritual Emphasis Days when Rev. Nteff and Rev. Ngum challenged us to *new* levels of commitment. Like a *new* Cameroonian Assistant Director of Nursing Services, who is doing a great job. We are continuing to work toward Cameroonization of more medical positions.

Like the gift of a *new* Unimog (a Mercedes cross between a tractor and a small dump truck) through a Swiss Leprosy Relief Organization (ALES).

We express our sincere thanks to everyone who makes it possible for our leprosy and general hospitals to continue serving, witnessing, and experiencing new joys and troubles. Above all, praise be to God whose mercies are *new* every morning.



Dr. Dennis Palmer and Miss Daphne Dunger teach village health workers in the Life Abundant Program, begun in 1980 by the C.B.C. Medical Authority. This provides primary health care and health education in outlying areas. Each village "post" has a local guiding committee and two village health workers.

These workers undergo five weeks of classes and two weeks of practical field work as basic training. Then villages purchase a basic supply of medicines to be distributed by the workers. They also conduct measles and D.P.T. clinics.


Within the Convention the women are actively working toward the establishment of home economics facilities and courses.




### **Medical Facilities**

Two major construction projects are in progress. Work on the Mbem Baptist Health Centre expansion began with the arrival of Mr. and Mrs. Berndt Lemke and children in September 1980. The project is funded by grants from Bread for the World and the Baptist World Alliance.

In February 1981, Mr. Darrel Schuh and his family began constructing a dispensary building and staff houses for the Nkwen Baptist Dispensary at the Baptist Centre, Nkwen. This Laymen-in-Action project is an example of North American Baptists with specific technical skills coming to Cameroon for special assignments.





#### Baptist Schools Make Impact on Students' Lives

"570 teachers in Cameroon Baptist Convention primary and secondary schools instruct more than 24,500 students with the Word of God at least five times a week," says Rev. E. W. Yongkuma, Cameroon Baptist Convention Education Authority secretary.

"Schools are staffed with Christian principals and teachers so they can be instrumental in leading the students to the saving knowledge of Christ by their teaching and personal lives," continues Yongkuma.

Each school has a chaplain who coordinates the school's religious program, which includes annual Spiritual Emphasis Days.

"We have found Spiritual Emphasis Days in our primary schools to be one of the most effective ways of winning youth to Christ," says Yongkuma. "The pastors in the local Baptist churches who take part in the Spiritual Emphasis Days followup the children who make professions of faith in Christ as Savior."

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### **DANKET DEM HERRN!**

David singt: "Ich danke dem Herrn von ganzem Herzen und erzaehle alle deine Wunder" (Ps. 9,2). Wieviel Dankbarkeit bringen wir zum Ausdruck?

Viele haben am vorjaehrigen Danksagungstag zum letzten Mal ihre Dankbarkeit bekundet. Seitdem haben sie nicht mehr gedankt; sie klagen; sie finden nichts, wofuer sie dankbar sein koennten.

Letzten Sommer mussten viele Bauern mit ansehen, wie ihre Weizenernte vertrocknete, wie ihre Huehner tot umfielen, wie das Vieh verkauft werden musste, bevor es marktfertig war - alles der aussergewoehnlichen Hitze wegen. Andere befanden sich in einer Gegend, die verwuestet und unter Vulkanasche begraben wurde. Wie koennen diese Menschen dem Herrn danken?

Wieder andere haben ihre Arbeit oder ihren Betrieb verloren. Manche Pensionaere stellten fest, dass sie der hohen Benzinkosten wegen nicht mehr reisen koennen. Manche haben ihre Gesundheit verloren - oder einen ihrer Lieben — oder einen Freund. Sie sind nun allein. Manche graemen sich wegen eines Kindes, dass seinen eigenen Weg gegangen ist - dem Wunsch der Eltern entgegen.

Einer dieser Gruende genuegt oft, um uns vom Danken abzuhalten. Hiob jedoch, ein Mann des Glaubens, stand vielen dieser Dinge auf einmal gegenueber. Und doch ruft er aus: "Der Herr hat's gegeben, der Herr hat's genommen; der Name des Herrn sei gelobt!" (Hiob 1,21).

Oft sind unerkannte Segnungen in den Dingen die uns befallen - Segnungen, die wir nicht sehen und verstehen moegen. Gott geht seltsame Wege mit uns. Er fuehrt uns nicht immer auf dem Pfad, den wir gewaehlt haben. Bedeuter das Unglueck - oder fuer uns Glaeubige Gottes allmaechtige Vorschung, seine Segnung, fuer die wir, wenn unsere Augen geoeffnet wuerden, danken muessten? Wir haben viel, wofuer wir dankbar sein koennen, aber vor allem fuer geistliche Segnungen in Jesus Christus -

stetig und unveraenderlich.

### Nuechterne Gedanken zum Erntedankfest

"Halleluja! Danket dem Herrn; denn er ist freundlich, und seine Guete waehret ewiglich" (Ps. 106,1).

Wer hat nicht als Kind dieses Tischgebet gelernt? Wir haben es wohl ueber die Jahre so oft ausgesprochen, ohne dabei den Hintergrund dieser Schriftstelle zu bedenken. Aber irgendwie haengt das Danken doch mit dem Denken zusammen. Schon als Kinder mussten wir immer wieder zum Danken ermahnt werden. Wie oft musste die Mutter sagen: "Na, was sagt man da ...?" Oder: "Wie heisst das schoen ... ?" Trotz haeufiger Ermahnungen seitens der Eltern haben wir doch viel zu leicht vergessen uns zu bedanken, wenn wir etwas geschenkt bekamen, oder wenn uns jemand eine freudige Ueberraschung bereitete. Es war so leicht, dies alles als ganz selbstverstaendlich hinzunehmen.

Meine Mutter erzaehlte oefter eine kleine Episode aus dem Leben meines aelteren Bruders, die uns als Beispiel dienen sollte. Anscheinend war unsere Familie zu Besuch bei Verwandten auf dem Bauernhof in Schwaben. Nach dem Essen sollte sich mein Bruder hoeflich fuer die gute Mahlzeit bedanken. Er weigerte sich aber entschlossen mit der Erklaerung: "Ich brauch doch net dankschoen sagen. Ich bin doch auch a Schuster!" Damit drueckte er auf kindliche Weise aus, was wir als Erwachsene oft stillschweigend als selbstverstaendlich in Kauf nehmen. Selbst als Glaeubige erwarten wir oft selbstverstaendlich, dass uns der Segen Gottes zusteht, weil wir eben auch zu seiner Familie gehoehren. Wie oft bedenken wir aber dabei, dass es doch immer wieder neue Gnade Gottes ist, wenn wir im Leben gesegnet werden? Das Beispiel der Israeliter kann uns dabei zur Lehre dienen, indem wir hier die menschliche Tendenz ganz sichtbar vor Augen gefuehrt bekommen. Das Tischgebet, das wir so oft im Leben wiederholt haben, kann uns eine Ermahnung werden, besonders wenn wir dabei den ganzen biblischen Zusammenhang lesen, und vielleicht noch besser in dem geschichtlichen Zusammenhang mit 5. Mose 6 betrachten. Denn zwischen diesen beiden Schriftstellen besteht zumindest eine thematische Verbindung, die wir nicht vergessen sollten.

In 5. Mose 6 ermahnte Mose das Volk Gottes, dass sie sich auf die neue Zeit vorbereiten sollten. Die Israeliter naeherten sich zu der Zeit dem Ende ihrer vierzigjaehrigen Wuestenwanderung. Moses wusste, dass ihm nur noch wenig Zeit blieb, und dass sein Volk vor einem neuen Zeitabschnitt stand. Sobald sie im Gehorsam auf Gottes Befehl das verheissene Land in Besitz nehmen wuerden, stand ihnen eine ganz grosse Umstellung bevor. Koennen wir uns

diese Umstellung vorstellen? ... Diese Israeliter, die waehrend der letzten vierzig Jahren als Nomaden in der Wueste ziellos hin- und hergezogen waren, bis die ganze ungehorsame Generation ausgestorben war .... Sie kannten nichts als Wuestensand, gelegentliche Wasserstellen, um die man mit raeuberischen Banden kaempfen musste ... armselige Zelte und tragbare Haushaltsgeraete. Immer wieder mussten sie mit ihren Tieren weiter wandern in Suche nach Wasser und spaerlicher Vegetation. Es gab damals heisse Tage und oft kalte Naechte ... Wuestenstuerme ... und feindliche Nachbarstaemme, vor denen man sich in acht nehmen musste. Diesen Israelitern waren die folgenden Verheissungen Gottes gegeben:


"Wenn dich nun der Herr, dein Gott, in das Land bringen wird, das er deinen Vaetern Abraham, Isaak und Jakob geschworen hat dir zu geben, grosse und feine Staedte, die du nicht gebaut hast, Und Haeuser, alles Guts voll, die du nicht gefuellt hast, und ausgehauene Brunnen, die du nicht ausgehauen hast, und Weinberge und Oelberge, die du nicht gepflanzt hast, dass du essest und satt werdest" (5. Mose 6, 10-11).

Wenn man diese Verheissungen im Lichte der nomadischen Armut betrachtet, dann sollte man doch gewiss denken, dass solch ueberraschender Reichtum ganz selbstverstaendlich zum Dank leiten muesste! Ganz sicher wuerden die Israeliter niemals vergessen, was der Herr grosses an ihnen getan hatte. Nie wieder wuerden sie von ihm abirren und sich vom falschen Glanz der Umwelt verblenden lassen, oder gar falschen Goettern dienen wollen! Der Beweiss seiner Guete und wunderbaren Fuersorge war doch zu gross .... Und doch fuehlte Moses es angebracht und sogar notwendig sein Volk vor der guten Zeit zu warnen, weil er eben die undankbare Natur seiner Mitmenschen nur allzu gut kannte. Deshalb fuhr er fort:

"So huete dich dass du nicht des Herrn vergessest, der dich aus Aegyptenland, aus dem Diensthaus, gefuehrt hat; Sondern du sollst den Herrn, deinen Gott fuerchten und ihm dienen und bei seinem Namen schwoeren. Und sollst nicht andern Goettern nachfolgen der Voelker, die um euch her sind ... " (5. Mose 6,12-14).

Es scheint also, als ob es uns leichter faellt, Gott zu dienen und ihm fuer unser taegliches Brot zu danken, wenn es uns nicht ganz so gut geht! Auch als Christen ist es wohl so, dass wir die Armut geistlich gesehen besser verkraften koennen als den ploetzlichen Reichtum.

Wenn ich so zurueckdenke an die Zeit meiner Auswanderung .... Als ich damals als Einwanderer ankam, steckten all mein Hab und Gut in einer Kiste und einem Koffer. Dazu erhielt ich einen Umschlag mit zwoelf

🜔 ie Menschen in Nigerien sind sehr offen fuer das Evangelium! sagte unsere Missionarin, Minnie Kuhn, kurz nach ihrer Rueckkehr aus Afrika, als die Schriftleiterin Gelegenheit hatte, sich mit ihr zu unterhalten.

Welche Eindruecke oder Erlebnisse draengen sich dir so kurz nach der Rueckehr aus Nigerien auf?

Wir haben aufgrund von Personalmangel im verganenen Jahr sehr unter Druck gearbeitet. Es war darum ein schweres und manchmal entmutigendes Jahr fuer mich. Vielleicht sollte ich das jetzt nicht sagen, denn nachdem ich eine Weile zu Hause war, mag ich meine Meinung aendern.

Welche Aufgaben hattest du in den letzten Jahren auf dem Missionsfeld?

Nach meiner Ankunft arbeitete ich bis September 1979 im Regierungskrankenhaus in Warwar. Das Krankenhaus wurde von unserer Mission gebaut und spaeter von der Regierung uebernommen. Waehrend ich dort als Krankenschwester arbeitete, war ich auch fuer die Evangelisation verantwortlich. Spaeter uebernahm ich vollamtlich die Evangelisationsarbeit. Nebenbei unterrichtete ich wegen Lehrermangel auch noch in der Bibelschule und half bei theologischen Fortbildungskursen.

Nehmen die Menschen in Nigerien immer noch das Evangelium von den Missionaren an?

O ja, sie sind sehr offen fuer die Verkuendigung des Evangeliums

durch Missionare, Rev. Peter Schroeder war Gastredner auf unserer Gebietskonferenz, bei der die Gemeinden aus unserer Umgebung zusammenkommen. Durch seine Wortverkuendigung kam es zu 40 Bekehrungen und 65 Neuweihen. Die einheimischen Leiter wuerden es sehr gern sehen, wenn wir uns mehr an der lokalen Evangelisationsarbeit beteiligen wuerden. Wir tragen die Hauptverantwortung in der Schulung



und Ausbildung, aber sie wuerden es sehr begruessen, wenn wir auch an der eigentlichen Evangelisation beteiligt waeren. Dabei muessen wir als Missionare allerdings etwas vorsichtig sein, denn die Religionsgesetze verbieten es uns, die eingezaeunten Grundstuecke zu betreten, es sei denn, man laedt uns ein. Es bietet sich aber reichlich Gelegenheit, Schriften zu verteilen. Wir werden beinahe ueberall, wo wir uns bewegen, gefragt: "Hast du ein Buch fuer mich, oder sonst irgendetwas zu lesen?" Das Verteilen von Schriften bietet uns eine gute Missionsmoeglichkeit. Ein Vorrat von guten Traktaten wuerde uns dabei sehr helfen. Amerikanische Traktate sind jedoch nicht immer geeignet. Es sollten gute, einfache Traktate sein, oder aber auch Traktate, die nur einige Schriftverse enthalten.

Auf dem Weg zu unserer Missionskonferenz in Bamenda kamen wir

zum Grenzschutzposten. Nachdem wir abgefertigt waren, fragten die Soldaten, ob wir etwas fuer sie zu lesen haetten. Ich hatte zufaellig ein Traktat in meiner Handtasche, das wir fuer unsere "Gospel Teams" gebrauchen. Es beschreibt den Erloesungsplan anhand von Bildern und Texten. Die Burschen zankten sich beinahe darum, denn jeder wollte es haben. Auch mehrere Reisende, die mit uns zusammen ankamen, haetten

Ich wuerde z.B. vorschlagen, dass unsere Frauengruppen gute, einfache Traktate, die den Erloesungsplan in drei oder vier Punkten darlegen, besorgen und sie in ihren Karten oder Briefen an uns beilegen. Wir koennen sie bei uns haben und, wenn sich eine Gelegenheit bietet, verteilen. Dies ist ein Dienst, den manche Gruppen tun koennten.

gesagt, er benehme sich genauso wie ein verwoehntes Kind (Ortega y Gasset).

Beide, der moderne Mensch und das verwoehnte Kind sind gewoehnt, dass ihnen alle Wuensche erfuellt werden. Kaum hat irgendein Schaufenster oder ein Katalog irgendeinen neuen Wunsch geweckt, so muss man es schon haben. Man sagt zu sich selbst wie eine weichliche Mama: "Natuerlich, mein Liebling, du sollst es haben. Ich sehe ein, es ist wirklich notwendig. Morgen, oder wenn es garnicht anders geht, uebermorgen .... ".

Falsches Begehren hat schon ganze Familien zerstoert und ihr Zusammenleben unmoeglich gemacht. Neid hat schon Freundschaften, Gemeinden zerstoert. Ein Mensch, der vom Neid getrieben wird, tut nicht nur anderen, sondern besonders sich selbst Schaden, denn diese Gefuehle des Neides koennen zu physischen und psychologischen Problemen fuehren.

Unser Leben als Geschoepfe Gottes steht auch heute noch unter seinen Geboten, die der Herr nie und nimmer aufgibt, auch wenn manches verwoehnte Kind an dieser Festigkeit zerbricht. "Du sollst nicht begehren ... deines Naechsten Haus (9. Gebot), deines Naechsten Weib, Knecht,



Magd, Vieh oder alles, was sein ist (10. Gebot). Er stellt unser "Habenwollen" von der Ewigkeit her in Frage. Er gibt uns sein Wort, dessen Schaerfe zwar schmerzt, aber unserem Menschsein vor Gott ungemein gut tut.

Er sagt: "Huetet euch vor dem Geiz: denn niemand lebt davon, dass er viele Gueter hat" (Lukas 12,15). Er sagt: So wie ich euch meinen Sohn geschenkt habe, so sollt ihr darauf achten, dass all euer Tun auf das Schenken gerichtet ist. Die Folge des Habenwollens ist nur eins: Selbsttaeuschung, die bis in die Ewigkeit reicht: "Aber Gott sprach zu ihm: Du Narr! Diese Nacht wird man deine Seele von dir fordern; und wes wird's sein, das du bereitet hast?" (Lukas 12,20).

Was schaffen wir uns Unheil und Verdruss mit Wuenschen die sich meist am Rande der finanziellen Moeglichkeiten oder darueber hinaus bewegen. Wie ganz anders ist es, wenn unser Begehren auf das lohnende Ziel ausgerichtet ist: "Trachtet am ersten nach dem Reiche Gottes und nach seiner Gerechtigkeit, so wird euch solches alles zufallen" (Matth. 6,33). So werden andere Werte vor uns ausgebreitet, die einen bleibenden

Gewinn haben. 🗆

Frage: Wie sollen wir uns als Baptisten zur Taufe und Mitgliedschaft von Kindern stellen? I.M.

Antwort: Der weitere Wortlaut Ihrer Frage laesst erkennen, dass es Ihnen um etwas Konkretes geht: veroeffentlichte Taufbilder in unserem Organ zeigen manchmal eine Schar von Kindern (Pastor im Hintergrund) die getauft worden sind. In Sachen 'Taufe und Mitgliedschaft' muessen wir biblisch vorangehen - unter Beruecksichtigung der baptistischen Taufpraxis.

Prinzipiell sieht es folgendermassen aus: Baptisten prakitzieren keine Kindertaufe sondern nur eine Glaubenstaufe; wobei zu bemerken ist, dass Kinder ohne weiteres glaeubig sein koennen. Ich moechte es gleich vorweg erwaehnen, es kann trotz aller Aufmerksamkeit hinsichtlich baptistischer Grundsaetze, zu einer unweisen Taufpraxis kommen. Die Beteuerung, dass bestimmte Kinder glaeubig sind (woran, nebenbeigesagt, niemand zweifelt) ist in manchen Faellen nicht der springende Punkt. Es geht manchmal einfach darum, dass hinter den jugendlichen Taeuflingen strebende oder gar ehrgeizige Eltern (Grosseltern) stehen, die es gerne sehen wuerden, wenn ihre Angehoerigen sich taufen liessen und so zur Gemeinde kaemen. Manchmal handelt es sich auch um ueberaus eifrige Pastoren, die das harmlose Verlangen ueberkommt, zu taufen. All' diesen und anderen Bestrebungen duerfen wir keinen Vorschub leisten! Die Frage, die ich zu beantworten suche, erkundigt sich nach unserem Standpunkt; wie sollen wir uns dazu stellen? Unsere Stellungnahme muss biblisch, vernuenftig und korrekt sein. Es sei nebenbei bemerkt, dass derartige Stellungnahmen uns nicht populaer machen.

Dollar, die mir als Anfangshilfe von der Einwanderungsstelle gegeben wurden. Damit kam ich nach Winnipeg, wo ich in der Mietwohnung meines aelteren Bruders Aufnahme fand. Ich schlief damals im Wohnzimmer auf einem Rollbett, das tagsueber zusammengeklappt und mit einer Decke zugedeckt in die Ecke gestellt wurde, um etwas mehr Platz zu machen. Die Kueche hatte nur eine armselige Einrichtung, und das Wasser zum Kochen musste man nebenan im Badezimmer holen. Es gab nur drei alte Stuehle, einer davon ohne Lehne, sonst sassen wir auf Apfelkisten. Das Essen war oft recht aermlich, weil eben nicht immer Arbeit zu finden war. Dennoch kann ich mich kaum erinnern, dass wir je einen Sonntag ohne Gaeste waren. Meistens Neueinwanderer, die noch keine neue Heimat gefunden hatten. Sie wurden nach dem Gottesdienst auf's beste bewirtet und dann wieder in den Abendgottesdienst mitgenommen. Kein Wunder, dass damals viele zum Herrn fanden. Es war eine Zeit grosser Dankbarkeit, weil wir alle einen neuen Anfang machen durften. Man war dankbar auch fuer die kleinsten Hinweise der Liebe und Treue Gottes und teilte gern mit den Mitmenschen, die uns Gott in den Weg stellte.

Ich glaube, viele unserer Sendbotenleser koennen wohl auf aehnliche Erfahrungen zurueckblicken. Wie steht es aber jetzt? Jetzt, wo wir in unseren eigenen Haeusern wohnen manipuliert werden-und den Sachverhalt nicht verstanden haben -dann gilt es, dieses zu erkennen und zu korrigieren. Die Taufe erreicht nur dann ihren biblischen Zweck, wenn der Taeufling selbst getauft werden will, und nicht, wenn andere es gern sehen. wenn so-und-so getauft werden wuerde. Ich moechte hiermit nicht sagen, dass Personen, sagen wir unter dem zweoelften Lebensjahr, nicht getauft wereden sollten; es kommt einfach auf den Sachverhalt und auf den Kandidaten an.

Ich schreibe aus jahrelanger Erfahrung und formuliere daher folgendermassen: wenn zu erkennen ist, dass angehende Taeuflinge die Zusammenhaenge bezueglich der Taufe und Mitgliedschaft nicht erfasst haben, dann gilt es zu warten. Die Taufe bzw. Mitgliedschaft entscheidet ja nicht zwischen Heil oder Unheil (Gerettetsein oder Verlorengehen), sondern sie ist ein Gehorsamsschritt. ---

Mit diesen Worten wende ich mich an ein Gemeindemitglied: ich moechte meinen Kollegen im Dienst keine Vorschriften machen, wann oder wen sie taufen sollen. Derartige Fragen muessen im Rahmen der Ortsgemeinde entschieden werden.

Frage: Pastor Duncan, was haeltst Du von Krankenheilungen? Kevin V.

Antwort: Allgemeingestellte Fragen beantworte ich in allgemeiner Hinscht; waere die Frage genauer gestellt, haette ich sie eingehender beantworten koennen. Was ich von Krankenheilungen halte? Ziemlich viel! Leider werden aber nicht alle Kranken gesund. Es liegt auch garnicht im Bereich unserer Erwartungen, dass alle Kranken gesund werden. Sollte es aber tatsaechlich zu einer Heilung kommen, dann bin ich dafuer. Kevin, unterscheide bitte zwischen einer vorlaeufigen Besserung und einer Heilung. Ein Krankheitszustand ist eine hoechst individuelle Angelegenheit und kann daher nicht allgemein beantwortet werden. -PD

und vielleicht selbst noch ein oder zwei Haeuser vermieten ... Jetzt, wo wir nicht nur ein, sondern vielleicht zwei oder drei Autos besitzen ... Jetzt, wo wir eine sichere Stellung haben ... uns grosse Reisen leisten koennen ... Ein Wochenendhaus am See oder einen Reisewohnwagen besitzen ... Sind wir noch genau so dankbar wie damals? Sind wir dankbarer geworden? Sind wir immer noch so gastfreundlich, ganz gleich, ob die anderen uns das wieder vergelten koennen? Ist unser Heim immer noch eine Staette der Mission, in der wir versuchen. Menschen zum Heiland zu bringen? Wie steht es mit unserer Opferbereitschaft in Bezug auf Geld, Zeit und Einsatzbereitschaft zur Mitarbeit?

## Nachrichten Aus Aller Welt

#### "JAHRHUNDERT DER CHRISTENVERFOLGUNG"

Von einem "Jahrhundert der Christenverfolgung" sprach der Praesident von "Christian Solidarity International", der Schweizer Pfarrer Hansjuerg Stueckelberger, auf der Jahrestagung dieser Weltorganisation in Zuerich. Vor rund 40 Delegierten aus 14 Laendern stellte Stueckelberger fest, angesichts der wachsenden Ideologisierung der Welt sei eine weitere Eskalation zu erwarten. Mit der Verfolgung und Behinderung von Christen in totalitaeren Staaten werde eines der wesentlichsten Grundrechte gebrochen.

Wie aus einer Presseerklaerung hervorgeht, berichteten Experten vor der Jahresversammlung ueber die Unterdrueckung christlicher Minderheiten in verschiedenen Laendern der Welt. Dabei wurde auf die Leiden der koptischen Kirche in Aegypten, der armenischen und syrisch-orthodoxen Kirchen in der Tuerkei, der Protestanten und Katholiken in den baltischen Staaten sowie die Verfolgung afrikanischer und indischer Christen verwiesen. epd

#### IM JAHRE 2000 SECHS MILLIARDEN MENSCHEN?

Die Weltbevoelkerung wird bei gleichbleibenden Bedingungen bis zum Jahr 2000 um 50 Prozent auf 6.3 Milliarden anwachsen. Zu diesem Ergebnis kommt die noch im Auftrag des frueheren U.S.-Praesidenten Carter erarbeitete Studie "Global 2000". In der Studie wird eine schnelle Verschlechterung der globalen Lebensqualitaet vorausgesagt, falls sich die Politik nicht aendert und der technologische Fortschritt unveraendert anhaelt.

Als eine Folge der wachsenden Ueberbevoelkerung stellen die Autoren den weltweiten Raubbau dar. Ein Beispiel dafuer sei die Zunahme des Wuestenguertels in der Sahelzone. Hier komme den Kirchen eine besondere, neue Verantwortung zu, meinte Hubert Weinzierl, stellvertretender Vorsitzender des Bundes fuer Umwelt- und Naturschutz. Wegen der raschen Zunahme der Weltbevoelkerung wuerden z. B. die tropischen Regenwaelder gepluendert, mit allen sich daraus ergebenden Konsequenzen. epd

#### BIBELDRUCK IN RUSSLAND GENEHMIGT

"Da die Regierungen in Osteuropa gesehen haben, dass sie mit der Existenz einer Kirche in ihren Staaten rechnen muessen, werden sie auch bereit, den Christen die Genehmigung zu geben, Bibeln zu drucken oder einzufuehren", aeusserte der Generalsekretaer des Weltbibelbundes, Ulrich Fick. So konnten beispielsweise 1979 in Leningrad 20 000 Bibeln gedruckt werden. Rev. Samson Khama, C.B.C. executive secretary, and Rev. Ray Hoffman, evangelism secretary, discuss goals adopted by the C.B.C. for the next five years. The primary goal is to increase Convention membership by 15,000 by Dec. 31, 1985.

#### Needs in Evangelism

The church ministries of the C.B. Convention need missionaries in the area of evangelism. At present, there are no full-time missionaries serving as area coordinators. Two Cameroonian pastors have been appointed as area advisors, while all 16 fields do employ Cameroonian field pastors.



#### Working and Witnessing Through Evangelism and Outreach



The Cameroon Baptist Convention supports mission work in Mamfe, Mamfe Overside, and Ndian. New congregations have begun in Yaounde and Bafoussam, and efforts are being made to establish one in Douala.

After more than six years of searching, a plot of land in the capital city of Yaounde was purchased in early December 1980. Acting quickly, the leaders of the Yaounde church obtained a building certificate. Mr. Berndt Lemke met with the leaders regarding a site plan. It will be followed up with a temporary building for worship until a permanent structure can be erected. The church presently meets in a school

### Japan—Is It The Dawn of Revival?

The Rev. Fred Folkerts, during his first visit to Japan, helped the missionaries and the Japan Baptist Conference establish a base upon which to develop strategies and field goals. Our mission's focus for the 1980s will be upon strengthening the existing works in Japan, rather than starting new projects. Expansion in

Japan will come as the younger churches grow into firm, mature churches.

North American Baptists presently are supporting two pastors, the Rev. Yukio Fujie and Rev. Yoshiharu Hata. "We need two more pastors in established churches," Missionary Ronald Stoller states. "As you give, pray for these two pastors as well as the other four who are working in self-supporting churches."

#### even more exciting is to hear reports of pastors and laymen who are dedicating themselves anew to our Lord Jesus Christ in prayer," reports the Rev. Wilfred L. Weick, field secretary.

"An evangelistic highlight was the October 1980 Billy Graham Crusade with results beyond expectations. Though the church in Japan faces problems of the 'follow-up,' we are seeing positive results. For example, five persons were baptized at the Nagoya church Easter 1981," continues Mr. Weick. "All are the direct result of the crusade and follow-up in Nagoya. One of the candidates presently attending University may be a pastoral candidate in the future. Praise God!"

### Tsu Christian **Education Center**

For several years, our North American Baptist Mission, along with the Japan Baptist Conference, had been working toward the development of a Christian Education Center, a place for student evangelism and an English Institute. The English Institute would minister to the Japanese community through English teaching, be an arm of evangelistic outreach, provide income for the pioneer evangelism fund of the Japanese Baptist Conference, and provide possible training for missionaries in teaching English as a second language.

Additional goals for the Christian Education Center would be to provide for a Christian dormitory for university students and facilities for





various Japan Baptist Convention and mission activities.


While the above goals were being developed, unknown to any of us, a building three stories high was built almost overshadowing the tiny former  $12 \times 18$  foot student center. The owner, however, found himself in financial difficulties and could not meet his payments. When he learned the purpose for the Center, he chose to negotiate with us, since this fit closest with his own purpose; even though there were other prospective buyers. So the purchase of the land and building was made with funds available on the mission field at half its estimated value. God made the

impossible possible, and the transaction was made without sacrificing the present evangelistic church planting outreach.

Karin Klettke moved into her apartment in Matsusaka on a Wednesday in September 1980. She had just arrived in Japan as a shortterm missionary. On Saturday, as she was cleaning, she prayed that she might find a Christian friend. There was a knock at the door.

greetings in Japanese. Her heart was beating hard. She opened the door. There stood the only young adult girl she had seen at the small Matsusaka church on Wednesday night. This 21-year-old girl had most of the responsibility for the Sunday school work during the missionary's furlough. Fumiko Shiozaki, the girl, knew very little English.

With just as much fear of not being able to communicate as Karin was feeling, Fumiko said, "I want to be your friend."

Karin could hardly believe God's rapid reply to her prayer. Together, the girls enjoyed the rest of the

afternoon communicating with the use of a dictionary.

Less than four months after Karin was given this friend, on January 14, 1981, Karin had to be told that Miss Shiozaki had been hit by a truck and killed.

Why did God call to himself this girl who was the most active young person of this small church? This is not for us to ask.

However, we can thank God that. at the Christian funeral, Miss Shiozaki's non-Christian mother was exposed to the Christian world. In addition, on that occasion, a tape of one of Miss Shiozaki's testimonies was played. Miss Shiozaki was able to give her testimony to some 60

adults and Sunday school children even after her death.

Karin, as well as other previous short-termers in Matsusaka, had an effect on Miss Shiozaki. All of our short-termers have opportunities to share their lives in a variety of ways. Thank God for this.

Last spring, there were six shortterm missionaries on the field, but now there are only three. Pleas have gone out for replacements, but it seems there are very few interested in this work. The work of the shortterm missionary is a vital part of the total picture of our mission's work.

The major responsibility of the short-term missionary is that of teaching English in a variety of

places, becoming acquainted with their students, and then introducing these students to Christ and the church. Much time is spent by the short-term missionary out of class in personal contacts with students. The STMs have been a real encouragement to the churches in which they work despite the language barrier. We are all brothers and sisters in Christ regardless of nationality or language.

Continue to pray for new applicants of any age who would be willing to serve for two or three years.—Ronald Stoller, short-term missionary coordinator in Japan.

#### Inspiration, Communication, and Frustration

Three area Bible Conferences of the Mambilla Baptist Convention were a great success and blessing. The emphasis was on evangelism. Eighty-eight persons rededicated their lives to Christ, and 43 persons made first-time decisions to receive Christ as Savior. Follow-up statistics show that the Spirit is continuing to work, and the Christians are continuing to witness.

After seven or eight years of trying, we finally got a two-way radio. On December 12, 1980, we were able to transmit and receive our first communication. We have regularly scheduled broadcasts three times each day on a network that connects us with most parts of Nigeria and directly with Cameroon as well. It is a real blessing, and we thank God.

There is a great need for missionaries in the Mambilla Baptist Mission. Minnie Kuhn, evangelism secretary and acting T.E.E. director, is now home on furlough, which

leaves us without a worker in both of these areas with no replacement in view. Mr. Ed Hoepner suffered severe injuries in a motorcycle accident in 1980 and is in the U.S.A. for treatment. A replacement is urgently required. We are down to two couples and one single missionary. We need people on the mission field. Don't just pray-COME out here and work a while.

### Evangelism-Mambilla Baptist Mission

Recently, Missionary Minnie Kuhn read, "The Work of God in the world is given out as *piece work* among his children." She states, "I am glad that we all have some 'piece work' to do, both here in Nigeria and at home in North America. "Here in Mambilla, Nigeria, new churches are springing up, and new members are being added to old churches. As of October 1980, we

have a first for our Mambilla Baptist Convention: we have sent out our first missionary. Yes, we have sent a national as a missionary to an unreached area off the Mambilla Plateau, and the Convention is taking care of his needs. God is wonderful.

#### Teaching and Training

"This growth leads to a tremendous need for training and teaching. In view of this, we had leadership training courses for our Bible school graduates, church pastors, and leaders. The subjects taught were Romans 1-8 and a course on Christian marriage. Later in the year, these men went out two-by-two and taught the leaders in the associations who in turn taught the courses in the local churches.

"There is a tremendous need to visit and counsel with Christians in the local churches. This is especially necessary when we see so many of our pastors and church workers going into the teaching of Christian religious knowledge in the primary schools. They have little time left to properly prepare and "feed the flock

of God." Government has given permission for us to have a religious knowledge teacher in every school of which we have 182. New people are to be recruited. They will need training and supervision. The government secondary school (high school) and teacher training center are asking for teachers of Bible knowledge."

#### Annual Conferences and Retreats

Every organization in the church has a conference or retreat each year. There are three fields in the Mambilla Baptist Convention, and each field has a women's conference, men's conference, deacons' retreat, 3H Girls (Pioneer Club), Christ's Ambassadors Boys' Club, pastors' retreat, school teachers and school chaplains' retreat, and a senior youth retreat. This makes about 23 different meetings for which your missionaries prepare materials and help in the teaching.

#### Theological Education by Extension

Theological Education by Extension is a tremendous educational opportunity, but there is little time in which to do it. The faculty members



of Mambilla Baptist Theological School travel to various areas every other Saturday to hold four seminars.

Missionary Minnie Kuhn teaches and trains the graduating students at Mambilla Baptist Theological School to be seminar leaders as well as about 17 nationals not in the school. This helps a great deal in expanding the T.E.E. program. At present, there are 18 groups and requests for four more. These leaders need a lot of supervision and help. This work cannot be carried on without your enthusiastic support.

#### Medical— Mambilla Baptist Mission

After receiving a supply of medicines from Jos, Nigeria, Missionary Barbara Kieper, R.N., started a Mobile Public Health Program toward the end of February 1980. She traveled to 20 villages where 18 of the villages chose a Village Health Worker. While in the villages conducting health clinics,

Missionary Barbara Kieper, R.N., director of health ministries Miss Kieper trained these Village Health Workers. This training was followed by a concentrated twoweek course plus a refresher course. Missionary Minnie Kuhn, R.N., assisted with the teaching.

Missionary Curt Radke has been busy in Mayo Ndaga building a new house for Miss Kieper. When it is finished, it will become headquarters for her, as she travels to do her clinic work and health training program. So far, Miss Kieper has been living in Gembu, and her medical supplies are stored at Mbu six kilometers away. Her new home and her medical headquarters will be in the same building.

While seeing patients with the Village Health Worker, Missionary Kieper asks the pastors and church teachers to witness to the people while they are waiting to see her.

Warwar Field has 10 health stations; Mayo Daga Field has five, and Gembu Field has four. This is the limit of what one nurse can do.

Plans for the future are to send one person to Yola and another to Kano for Rural Health training to continue, expand, and take over the work.

"Both the faculty members and the student body of Mambilla Baptist Theological School, Nigeria, send their sincere thanks to you for your gifts of books, money, some faculty members, and prayers for the growth of this school," says the Rev. Peter J. Tomnyi, principal of the school.













### Our Unique Colorado Ministry

Earl and Lois Ahrens are missionaries with our Spanish-American work in Monte Vista, CO. The following telephone "interview" with Lois Ahrens took place while she was in the midst of preparing for their summer camp, readying her house for the stay of a visiting pastor and his family of eight, and otherwise moving into a series of hectic summer activities.

- Sara: We are interested in seeing how the work of your field has continually changed and developed. What are your specific ministries at this time?
- Lois: I'm personally involved with a ladies' Bible study which meets once a week. We have many women who attend, but they cannot break away from their background enough to come to the church. Then I also teach a Sunday school class, and we have a tremendously successful children's Bible club. Our only problem is that there isn't enough lay help to keep up with the needs of large numbers of children.

Then, of course, our food ministry takes up much of Kathryn Hunt's, Earl's and my time. We distribute eight to ten tons of food every month for children from six years old and up. It's government surplus, but we keep the records and do the distribution, which means that we as missionaries do all the work of screening and deciding which children have the economic and physical needs for the program. Then, Kathryn needs to see all of these children in the clinic and keep medical records on them as well. I might mention that we have been authorized to have a second nurse/midwife, but we have no one yet-that's a real item of prayer.

### Niagara, I'm Coming

Niagara, I'm coming! You're quite an attraction in your own right. But I'm particularly thinking about that great hub of excitement being

sions,

We get a lot of company: that takes time. But we're so glad to have members of our N.A.B. family come to visit to see what is happening. We have two summer workers again this year who are doing a great job. They're very busy, so I cook for them, too.

We also have a Bible camp in the summer for our three churches, using a nearby campground. It's a tremendous ministry. We appreciate the chance to get some of these young people away from unhappy and unhealthy home situations even for a short while. But the sad thing is that after we have a good time with them, and such a good harvest, we have no Sunday school teachers to keep up

- a consistent ministry. So many of them stop coming to church within a couple of months. We also find this camp a real challenge. Most of these kids have no discipline at home and are not used to rules, so we need to limit the number of campers per counselor. Even so, we're often short-staffed.
- Sara: What are some of the unique aspects of the culture that you're working in? You spent many years in Cameroon. How does this cultural situation differ from what you experienced there?
- Lois: We found that the Africans had a great deal of selfconfidence, but here the opposite is true. Our people are terribly inhibited: it takes years before a convert has the confidence to do things in the church. This is one reason we have such a need for Sunday school teachers, for instance.

Another difference between the Africans and the Spanish-Americans is that the Africans usually had a strong extended family to support them. Here there is a very unstable family existence; I'd say that 90 percent of the children have no strong father image. When we started here, it was entirely a children's work. It was seven years before we had our first adult convert! The people needed to develop confidence in us and in our ministry. Now we're just beginning to have a whole-family ministry.

Most of our people come from a nominal but legalistic type of church background where they had assimilated mostly the negative and even some superstitious aspects. In fact, there is a real stigma on anyone who is

More and more the response to his messages is positive and results in fruit.

He's also always busy with the housing ministry, the non-profit housing for low-income people which you've read about previously. And, as I mentioned earlier, we are beginning to see results, to see a whole-family ministry develop: that's so encouraging!

Sara: Your ministry in Colorado is unique and special. What can we, as women, do specifically to help or to give you encouragement?

Lois: First, I have to say that the ladies of the W.M.F. are our lifeline. We're so much aware of

and depend on their prayer support. Please keep praying for the development of lay help within our congregation, for willingness to commit themselves to the Lord and have confidence that the Lord will enable them to do the work. 


